The Lecompton United Methodist Church clothes closet is located in the former high school (LCE building) 620 E. Woodson Ave. 3rd floor.



MAPLE GROVE CEMETERY NEWS

Policy Statement

Due to the increasing challenge of maintaining the beauty and uniformity of this sacred space along with the increasing cost and maintenance time required, the following guidelines have been adopted by the board.

Artificial flowers are encouraged year round when placed at headstones. An exception will be made for Memorial Day. However, the flowers must be limited to the headstone area by 10 days following Memorial Day.

Permanent plantings with thorns and large mature bushes are not allowed.

Above ground headstones are permitted. No other above-ground statuary is permitted unless it is at the headstone.

All non-complying plantings and statuary need to be removed in a timely manner.

These guidelines have been adopted in order to be fair to everyone.

We would appreciate your cooperation before the mowing season begins. Thank you.

Outdoor Burning Information from

Consolidated Fire District #1

Spring marks the beginning of the burning season for fields and brush piles across our communities. These prescribed burns play a critical role in maintaining grassland health, recycling field nutrients, controlling unwanted trees and brush, and reducing wildfire risk. Controlled burns are an important tool for landowners to rejuvenate grasslands and agricultural use areas.



Did you know that prescribed burning is regulated by the State and local guidelines? Kansas Administrative Regulation (K.A.R.) 28-19-645 Through 28-19-648 outline requirements for open burns, responsibility for monitoring burns, and types of allowed fuels. Douglas County Home Rule Resolution 23-11-3 further addresses open burning regulations and fire safety requirements within the unincorporated areas of Douglas County.

These regulations are intended to ensure prescribed burning and other open burning is safe, controlled and reduces the impact to surround areas.

I would encourage everyone to read both the K.A.R's and Douglas County Resolution. This information can be found on the county website under the "Fire and Burning" section of the Emergency Management page. For this article, we will highlight areas of extreme importance.

Prior to conducting a prescribed or open burn, you <u>MUST</u> confirm that open burning is allowed by calling the burn line and registering with Douglas County Dispatch on the day of the burn. This is a requirement of both K.A.R. and Douglas County Resolution.

Burn Hotline: 785-832-5394

This county burn line is updated every morning by 8 a.m. and will indicated if burning is authorized for that day. If burning is authorized, you must select **Option 0** on this line to register your burn. Your will log your name, contact phone number, location of the burn, size/area of the burn, and the material being burned.

- Understand that open burning is not authorized under certain forecasted conditions
 - o Rangeland Fire Danger Index is High and forecasted sustained winds greater than 15 mph.
 - o Rangeland Fire Danger Index is Low or Moderate and forecasted sustained winds greater than 20 mph.
 - Local conditions of dryness
 - o Resource limitations of local Fire Departments

To ensure a safe burn, we recommend the following:

- Develop a written prescribed burn plan
 - o Know how many people and equipment you will need
 - o Talk with your neighbors and burn together.
 - o Determine if site and moisture conditions are appropriate
 - o If conditions are not favorable, postpone the burn until conditions improve
 - o Prepare the site
- Create adequate fire breaks. These can be moved, disked lines, or natural fire breaks
 - O Size of fire breaks will vary depending on fuel type and moisture. In general, if only grass is present in the proposed burn area, the fire breaks need to be a minimum of 10 times the vegetation height.

- Observe the weather
 - o Know weather conditions on the day of burn and 2 to 3 days following.
 - o Daily fire weather can be found on the National Weather Service Site.
 - o Ideal conditions for prescribed burning are wind speeds between 8 to 13 mph and humidity greater than 30 percent.
 - o If a storm front and shifting winds is approaching, consider delaying the burn due to potential rekindling after the burn.
- Conducting the burn
 - o Continuous monitoring of changing weather conditions
 - Stay with the burn until it is completely extinguished
 - o Maintain adequate help and resources for the entire operation
 - Have your phone close to you and be prepared to answer if someone calls. Dispatch may try to contact individuals conducting prescribed burns to ensure everything is OK.
- Completing the burn
 - O Secure the area and patrol the burned edge several times after the burn is completed
 - o Extinguish any burning material within 100 feet of burned edge
 - o If standing trees are burning near the burned edge, cut them down
 - Check and monitor the burn area for the next 2-3 days ensuring nothing re-kindles.
- Contact 911 if you encounter any problems during your prescribed burn
 - Early notification will allow fire department resources to get there sooner to mitigate any problems.

The Kansas Forest Service provides a template for personal Wildland Fire Action Plan through their *Read, Set, Go* program. This resource is an excellent tool to assist with planning, preparation, and mitigation of wildland fire emergencies.

As previously stated, I encourage everyone to read K.A.R.'s 28-19-645 through 28-49-648 and Douglas County Home Rule Resolution 23-11-3 prior to conducting any prescribed burning this season.
